## Local history school project

Recently Kathie McMahon was invited by Kurrajong North Public School to present six local history modules to some of their students.

Kathie designed the modules and based their presentation around the music of Steve Rawling AM, a member of the Society. Steve has put musical arrangements to some of former Kurrajong poet Sid Sheldon's poems of *The Kurrajong*, as well as writing some new lyrics. The result was a musical record of aspects of Kurrajong's history. The disc and music are available from Steve or the Society.

The children enjoyed learning the catchy tunes and interacting with the associated historical information. By the end of the six weeks the children had completed their own history folders containing illustrated front covers, family trees of their forebears, and the local history information sheets that Kathie had gathered.

As a result of Kathie's successful programme the committee of KCHS reviewed the best folders selected by the school, and made presentations to acknowledge the efforts of the children.

President Frank Holland awarded first prize of a twentyfive dollar Wisemans book voucher, and a certificate of appreciation to Cassandra Stringfellow. Certificates of appreciation were also presented to Ursula Aczel, Luka Brodie, Rachel Humphries, Jacinda Stevenson, Madeline Stevenson and Olivia Suman.

Kathie is hopeful of encouraging other schools in the district to participate in this approach of introducing children to their local history.

## **Scarecrow festival**

Members of the Society enjoyed the contrasting themes of War and Peace in the Kurrajong' at the launch of our annual photographic exhibition on Friday, 26 October. On display were historic images of soldiers, some of the women who had supported the war effort, and scenes of the First World War accompanied by interesting images from our district.

As commemorations for the 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Australian Light Horse charge on the wells of Beersheba on 31 October 1917 approached, it was appropriate that our guest speaker, Shirley Seale, gave us a fascinating presentation on the *Walers*.

Shirley managed to have many of us dabbing our eyes as she explained to us the significant role that had been undertaken when the Australian Light Horsemen rode into battle on their faithful Waler mounts. Shirley enhanced her talk with the use of an overhead projector. She proceeded to read some of the poems and stories written by the men, many of whom were distraught when they realized that they would have to leave their horses behind due to Australia's quarantine restrictions.

Visitors to our exhibition over the weekend gave us very positive feedback. After viewing the exhibition a number of people told of their surprise at seeing the large number of the district's women who had became involved in the home front effort. Others enjoyed the quality and diversity of the accompanying war and peace images.

On Sunday we had an enjoyable visit from two of the musicians from the festival, one playing a squeeze box [accordion] and the other a guitar. A couple of our members joined in with the chorus singing and three grandchildren of members Pam and Ken Bennett were loaned percussion instruments to accompany the happy group.

Our raffle was drawn on Sunday afternoon. First prize of a Wollemi Pine and entry to Mount Tomah, donated by the management of Mount Tomah Botanic Gardens, was won by Mrs Robyn Stafford; second prize, a \$50 gift voucher donated by the manager of Windsor Riverview Shopping Centre, was won by Ms Faith Christie; and third prize, a copy of *Diggers Hill* donated by our society, was won by Mrs Pam Bennett.

We wish to thank all members who gave readily of their time and effort. We extend special thanks to the Kurrajong branch of the C.W.A. for providing their venue, Valerie Birch who designed and managed the photographic exhibition, Robyn Fuller for the preparation of supper, and Bryan Wyborn for transporting our display boards to and from the venue.

## Meredyth, James, and Sam

New bus for Mackay Tours

Meredyth Hungerford's obituary published in the May–June issue of *The Millstone* mentioned that she had been employed at the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency in their research department.

Headquartered in New York City, the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency is one of the world's largest.

One of their first successes was their 1912 campaign designed to convince women to use deodorant products, using the slogan: "You can't vote, but you can smell nice." They commissioned market research studies, and were the first agency to open a research department.

Sam Hood's career as a photographer began in the 1880s. He ran a successful business in portraits of ships and people in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. In 1918 he acquired the Dalny Studios at 124 Pitt St. Sydney and expanded his business into press photography, supplying images for the *Sydney Mail*, the *Australasian*, the *Daily Guardian*, the *Daily Telegraph Pictorial*, the *Labor Daily*, the *Sun*, the *Daily News*, and the *Sydney Morning Herald*. By the mid 1930s most newspapers employed their own photographers, and Sam's commissions from the papers declined. He was fortunate that he had many contacts within the entertainment industry who called upon him to document celebrities, events, and help them with their advertising.

This photo is from Sam Hood's collection at the State Library of NSW. The record states that it was taken by Sam for J. Walter Thompson on 27 April 1947, and the subject is a new bus for Mackay Tours, Kurrajong Heights. There is no mention, however, of the identity of the people in the photo or of the location where the photo was taken.

The people inside the bus are unlikely to have been passengers as the bus appears to be not registered and would not be legally able to transport them. Those standing in front would not all fit inside, so this appears to be a staged photo.

Members and readers might be able to add detail concerning the date, 27 April 1947, which could help identify those involved in the photo.

## Syd Sheldon – poet & musician

#### A RECOLLECTION BY KEITH FREEMAN

Syd's book of poems represents just one small part of his skills. I only met him late in his life when he had already entered the Richmond Nursing Home but I was impressed with his stories and in particular his love of music.

My wife, Margery, and myself moved into the Hawkesbury district in 1983 after my retirement without knowing one person in the district. The only person we had ever spoken to was the estate agent whom we met twice. We moved from Mount Helen near Ballarat in Victoria where we had been quite active in community work.

Margery had been particularly active with the Country Women's Association so she joined the Richmond branch and was immediately visiting the patients in the nursing home. One of the visitors played the piano and quite a few of the patients would join in the singing. However, the piano eventually gave up and was replaced with the gift of an electronic organ which the pianist said she could not play. So the hunt was on for an organist. I played the organ by ear and only for my own amusement and not for public appearance. After much persuasion I promised to just have a look at it.

Now nearly 20 years on I am still playing the successive gift organs as they come and go.

It was quiet early in the piece that I met Syd and heard about his activities. He had a dance band that was very popular for dances and other entertainment especially around the Kurrajong area. His stories were great, and of course many of them are preserved in his book. He played many musical instruments but he had not been able to bring them all into the nursing home. However he did have a mouth organ and a *jiggle stick* or whatever it is called. After considerable persuasion I managed to get him to accompany me on his mouth organ. We enjoyed many mornings playing the old songs and dance music.

The most remarkable thing was that I would start playing a tune, without telling Syd what it was going to be, and by about





the second note he would have picked up the tune and would provide the accompaniment at full strength. I didn't have any music, nor did Syd, and it could have been one of the seven or eight hundred that I knew and played at random. I never ceased to be amazed at his ability and still can't fathom it. We did keep strict tempo so that may have helped. Anyway, it was a sad time for me when Syd became too ill to play.

I purchased his book after Syd had passed on and I feel it is a book well worthy of being preserved as part of this area. There would not be too many people who would remember Syd now.

## **Christmas 1896**

The families of Kurrajong have been greeted again this Christmas, now just passed, by a nice parcel of books each from Mr J. Comrie of Northfield, the Heights. Your readers will remember that for many years this gentleman has distributed large quantities of publications amongst the families of this district as a Christmas greeting.

His object in doing so is to supply a little sound and useful Christian reading, and especially to those families who live beyond the reach of the ordinary services of any church.

Mr Comrie has distributed, this time, over 170 parcels containing over 9,000 publications amongst the families residing from Mount Tomah to Wheeney Creek, and those residing at Blaxland's Ridge, Colo Road, Bullridge, Comleroy Road, Salis' Flats, and South Kurrajong. These generous greetings are always gratefully received, and do much good.

## Narrow escape

On Monday evening last as Mrs Pitt, a resident of the Kurrajong, was in the act of removing a bag of flour in the store, she accidentally happened to disturb a snake which lay concealed close by. The dangerous reptile immediately seized and bit her on the hand; she instantly shook the venomous creature off, and her husband, Mr Robert Pitt, being handy by, lost no time in sucking the wound and succeeded in withdrawing the poisonous humour, but not however without incurring the most imminent risk of his own life, for he had no sooner done so than he was seized with the usual lethiferous symptoms attending snakebites.

Medical attendance was immediately sent for. In the meantime a native *crodgee* (aboriginal doctor) hearing of the circumstance flew to his aid, and after alternately sucking the sides of his neck, seemingly with wonderful force, accompanying the operation with sundry rather curious gesticulations, declared him out of danger.

However, be this as it may, the prompt attendance and well known pharmaceutical skill of Dr Day, who shortly arrived, soon settled the point, and restored the quietude of the family, and it is with great pleasure we are thus enabled to announce the successful recovery of this truly philanthropic gentleman.



## D Company annual ball 1911



The September-October 2005 issue of The *Millstone* contained an article written by Ron Rozzoli outlining his thoughts on a photo published in an earlier edition. Since the article was published Ron kept digging for further detail and his effort was rewarded by finding an account of the ball in the Windsor and Richmond Gazette published Saturday, 8 July 1911. This article was first discovered by chance by Cathy McHardy.

It is now known the ball was a military one. D company Richmond annual ball was held in the main auditorium of the Richmond School of Arts and the date was Friday, 30 June 1911.

The following are extracts from the article in the Gazette giving mention to those who were present at the ball, and likely to be included in the photo, part of which is shown *above*. A framed copy of the original photo is on display at the Richmond School of Arts.

The duties of Masters of Ceremonies were carried out by Sgt. Travis and Pte. Harold McMahon. The caterer was Mr Peter Beveridge and the supper was recherchè [elegant]. The hosts were Lt. Bowman-Douglas OC and Lt. W. R. Allison of D Co. 3rd A.I. Regt. Other officers present were Maj. Helsham, army medical corps, Capt. Smith I.S., Capt. Hall A.I.H., Lt. H. Dunston A.I.H., and Lt. C. Pye of A Co. 3rd A.I. Regt. Also present was Mr Mulliner from the auditor's department, and the mayor, Mr T. Waters.


