Australia Day Breakfast 2016

The Society's Australia Day breakfast was delighted to have as guest speaker, not only a member but a genuine local, Don Webster, who spoke about the background and history about the location of the venue for the breakfast – the Kurrajong Heights Bowling Club. Don is about as local as you can get – the property on which he and Helen live is next door to the club, and on the same original property which was the subject of his talk. He is also a lifelong resident of the Heights, and his family connections go back to his great grandfather, who built St David's church, the oldest church in the Blue Mountains.

Quoting from Meredith Hungerford's history of Bilpin, Don began with "Rock Farm", a property of 50 acres selected for Eliza Lane by Joseph Stubbs. This was below Cut Rock, in the locality of Tabarag. It was later divided into two portions. Stubbs had been transported in 1803, but by 1828 he was free, and married Anne White (or Lane) from Castle-reagh. One of the two portions, called Merroo 6, changed hands a number of times, and in 1900, James Williamson was producing varieties produce from Rock Farm and was growing exceptionally large apples, both cooking and desert varieties, and in one season picked 120 bushels of peas.

In 1918, Daniel Hobby acquired Merroo 6, and this was the first time that the property was occupied, as none of the previous owners had developed it. A sawmill was established, and employed a number of locals, while Dan and his brother Archie bought the property opposite, (the original Kurrajong 208) and Dan opened a garage in Kurrajong in the late 1920s. Meanwhile, the heavy traffic generated by the mill meant that Bells Line of Road beyond Cut Rock was in very bad shape. In 1925, it was said that the road could be a tourist road, but because of its use by bullock teams travellers were advised to carry a pick and shovel for wash-aways and an axe for fallen trees.

The land was acquired by Walter Banks in the '1940s, and at some stage Merroo 6 was sub-divided, leading to the situation of the adjoining properties of the Webster's and the bowling club.

In 1965, Spencer Scott of Kurrajong Heights bought land next to the former sawmill, and with other members of the community, first thought of a golf course and then decided on the Kurrajong Heights Bowling and Recreation Club, the first AGM of which was in 1967 in a two-room clubhouse.

Later fundraising enabled extensions to be built, after some problems with Colo Shire Council, approval was gained by the Licensing Court. The extensions were opened in May 1980, in great ceremony, with representatives of local government, regional bowling associations, both men's and women's. The club had become even more important in the community after the disastrous fire which destroyed the Kurrajong Heights Hotel in 1975. **Cont. page 2**

A visit to the University of Sydney Great Hall and Nicholson Museum 16th February, 2016

Having arrived on the University of Sydney Campus via a rather circuitous route, the KCHS group was greeted by our guide Julia, under the quadrangle clock tower, of the sandstone university. Julia unravelled the history of the university buildings, constructed on old Grose Farm. In particular we focused on The Great Hall, officially opened in July 1859. Designed by Edmund Thomas Blacket 1854 in the Tudor Gothic Style, using Pyrmont sandstone from quarries nearby. The Great Hall was to be 135 feet x 45 feet x 71 feet high. On completion of the Hall, a two metre statue known as

the "Angel of Knowledge" was placed on top of the eastern gable. In June 1874, regarded as rather a precarious adornment this was removed and is lost to posterity. The hammerbeam roof of the interior resembles Westminster Hall, London. These beams are decorated with twelve carved wooden angel figures. The angels to the left and right above the dais bear scrolls inscribed in Latin, 'knowledge puffeth up, but charity edifieth' and 'The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom'. The other ten angels carry books inscribed with symbols referring to the Arts and Sciences over which they preside. Grammar is a papyrus roll, Dialectic is Aristotle's three figure diagram, Poetry has a harp, ethics the St Mary's lily, Metaphysics the sym-

bol of Deity, Arithmetic the abacus, Geometry the book of Euclid, Astronomy a star, Music the lyre and Physics an ancient pump. A rather grand building, the walls are hung with paintings of University Chancellors including Dame Marie Bashir, the end of the beams with the Crests of Australian Universities. In 1848 William Charles Wentworth in the NSW Legislative Council had proposed that the Sydney College become a larger University and that this was an imperative if Society was aspiring towards self-government. The University of Sydney Act was passed on 24 September 1850 and inaugurated on 11 October 1852 at what is now Sydney Grammar School. The University received Royal Charter in February 1858 from Queen Victoria.

OF INTEREST: Since the launch of the WW1 *We Remember Them* publication, the Society has received many thank you letters and cards from descendant families who have received a copy of the book. Below is a letter received from Keith Sidney Lavender the newest member of the Society and a descendant recipient of the WW1 publication. I am sure there are quite a few of you who knew Keith, who is now living at Heathwood in Queensland.

Dear Members,

I am writing to thank you for sending me the *We Remember Them* book. I knew so many of them and their families and it brings back memories of Kurmond and Kurrajong.

Before leaving for school I would deliver milk around Kurmond on horseback. One house was that of Mart Horan (WW1 p91). Mart had a butcher shop at the top of Longleat and Bells Line of Road, Kurmond. He died suddenly, leaving a wife and young daughter Betty.

I would like to know if anyone can remember when father started the dairy, I know it was operating in 1932. Interestingly, it was that year, Eric, Cliff and I were admitted to a hospital on the coast. I recall a nurse taking us kids down a steep track to the beach. Years later I spoke to my mother about the scarlet fever and diphtheria we had, and she told me it was the Prince Henry coast hospital.

Because they were infectious diseases and my father (George Lavender), ran a dairy and milk run in Kurmond and Kurrajong, our house and property were quarantined and fumigated. (Soldier Settlement 257 Bells Line of Road WW1 p100).

My father continued the milk run up until 1944, when I took over until 1951. After that date, our milk was sent from the family dairy to the milk board, until we sold our dairy and home in 1959—1960. Mother and father then retired to Port Macquarie, father died in 1967, mother living on until 1989.

One thing I would like to mention, that many may not know is that well after WW1 the Mill Road *millstones* were placed on the high bank at the junction of Bells Line of Road and Comleroy Road and a shed placed over them with a wire mesh front so you could view in. A German machine gun had been placed on top of the stones. After sometime the wire mesh was torn away and parts of the gun taken, eventually only the tripod and gun barrel were left and these were placed in the storeroom at Comleroy Hall.

About 1950 the Department of Main Roads decided, due to the number of accidents, to remove the embankment and rather carelessly, bulldozed over the *millstones* smashing them. Fortunately they did repair them!

KCHS Visit to the NSW Mounted Police Museum**16th February, 2016 (Suzanne Smith)**

Twenty-one members and friends of the Society arrived at the Museum in Redfern and were greeted at the open gate by guide and fellow KCHS member Stewart Thompson OAM. We were escorted to the training arena in time for a lively demonstration by 4 female troopers on horseback, their beautifully groomed horses obedient and disciplined under their commander/supervisor, and the riders' reins. An all female review! Apparently the NSW Mounted Police Force currently comprises 75% females, including the first female Commander of the unit, made up of 36 Officers and 38 horses.

The NSW Unit is the oldest continuous operational Mounted unit in the world. Formed by Governor Brisbane in 1825. By 1830 the more settled parts of the colony were divided into divisions. The main division was stationed in Sydney and located at Belmore Barracks, on the present site of Central Railway Station. This division also incorporated the Governor's Guard. The three country divisions were the Western at Bathurst, Argyle at Goulburn and the Hunter at Maitland.

By the 1900's the Mounted Police had a strength of over 800 personnel and over 900 horses. It was at the turn of the century that the Barracks were relocated to temporary accommodation at Moore Park Showground, before occupying the present site in 1907 at Bourke Street, Redfern. The present stable site was renovated in 1996.

The Mounted Police Unit has always been used for Traffic Duty, Public Relations Duties and formal Ceremonies. Of note and pointed out to us by our guide Stewart, the Unit has participated in the Royal Easter Show since 1895, performing the musical ride and Governor's escort excluding 1942-1946 during the war years, when no shows were held.

Over 80% of the Mounted Unit's core business is general high visibility patrols in and around the CBD and Local Area Commands. Performing general policing duties on horseback, they attend community events, parades and festivals. The Unit is an important element in crowd control, also assisting the Riot Squad, at protests, riots and large public events.

In Regional and Country areas the Mounted Police are used in searches for lost persons, escapees, drug plantations and the mustering of stolen or emaciated stock. They also work closely with RSPCA and local government impounding officers, tasks our guide Stewart performed for many years, stationed in Northern NSW as a member of the Mounted Police Force.

All constables are responsible for the care and maintenance of their own saddlery, grooming of the horses and stables. They require a high level of skill in drill, crowd control, escort duty through city streets, this also requires a high level of equestrian skill, along with Police procedures. Veterinary, farrier, truck and float transportation skills are also required.

Our tour of the Barracks and Museum, including Stewart's most informative talk, reflected the work of the NSW Mounted Police since the Unit's inception in the early colony, to the present day. *Thank you Stewart (Images David Griffiths)*





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Maclaurin Hall, the Old Fisher Library & Nicholson Museum, University of Sydney Quadrangle (K-CHS 16th February Excursion continued from page 3 & 6)

Housed in the lower section of the beautiful stone building once known as the Fisher Library is the Nicholson Museum. Full of antiquities and curiosities from the ancient world, mummies from Egypt, household pottery and items from Crete, Greece, Italy and Mesopotamia. Founded in 1860 by Sir Charles Nicholson to house the donation of his private collection to the University. "The Maclaurin Hall, the former Fisher Library is Gothic Revival in style. The building was designed to form a corner to the Quadrangle and is two storey on the Quadrangle side and three storey facing Manning Road. The southern facade features a central bay flanked by two turrets. The magnificent reading room is on the upper floor of this building and the hammerbeam roof of the hall is constructed of cedar and is based on English prototypes with which the Government Architect Walter Liberty Vernon was familiar." The Quadrangle design is based on those of Oxford and Cambridge. It contains one of only two carillons in Australia, the other being the one on Aspen Island in Canberra. Maclaurin Hall is in the centre left of the photo



ST ANDREWS COLLEGE

On leaving the Quadrangle we travelled to the far end of campus where we were met by Professor Ian Jack. Ian is well known to all of us living in the Hawkesbury Region. The College Archivist and resident Senior Fellow of the College, Professor Ian Jack is responsible for maintaining the College archives and has authored several books on the history of St Andrew's College. Ian gave a brief overview of the early history of the college, a co-ed residential academic community, governed by an elected Council. Set in its own grounds within the University, St Andrew's has offered residency, academic and social support to students for over 140 years. The St Andrew's College Incorporation Act received Royal Assent in 1867 from Queen Victoria and was only replaced by an updated Act as recently as 1998. It was in 1870 that the College Council first met and in 1876 the students entered the grand sandstone Scottish baronial building now known as the Main Building. Ian generously escorted our group from the Senior Common Room to the beautifully restored Junior Common Room and then upstairs to the Library with its silk screened ceiling panels and high windows, then on to the Main rather magnificent Hall, before visiting the Chapel. The College provides a home for many academically and musically gifted students.

Wheeny Creek Guest House, later known as *Rainbow Lodge*, with Little Wheeny Creek Bridge Kurrajong in the foreground. (Goldfinders Inn, not visible, is opposite). The guest house was built in 1930 for Mr Arnold Sampson. The name was later changed by new management to *Rainbow Lodge*. The building later being purchased by the Handicapped Children's Centre Sutherland to become a residential home. *Rainbow Lodge* was burnt down in 1971, but fortunately the organisation and those in their care had recently moved to another institution at Woodford.

The Story of the Wheenys There are two creeks in the Kurrajong area with similar names. **Little Wheeny Creek** flows from Grose Vale into Wheeny Creek about 2 kilometres west of where Comleroy Road crosses Wheeny Creek. **Wheeny Creek** flows from Bilpin into the Colo River just west of where Putty Rd crosses the river. Even though it is called a creek, Wheeny Creek is actually designated as a river by the NSW Geographical Names Board.

Wheeny Creek is also a designated locality, along where Wheeny Creek runs, in the Parish of Colo, County of Cook.

The NSW Geographical Names Board (GNB) was established in the Geographical Names Act 1966 to assign and otherwise regulate place names in NSW.

The GNB decreed the spelling of Wheeny without a third 'e' (Wheeny) for both these creeks on 3rd October, 1969. Locally the spelling with the extra 'e' had been commonplace even though parish maps going back to the late 1880s showed only the Wheeny spelling.

It was also recently thought by some that Little Wheeny Creek didn't have the 'e' but Wheeny Creek did. This is not supported by the GNB placenames database or parish maps. Our publication 'Kurrajong Collections' makes this incorrect assertion. A quick Google search shows the incorrect spelling is still quite common.

In our photo archive, we have elected to use the correct spelling except where the incorrect spelling is shown in a picture (eg 'Wheeny Creek Guest House').
